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# Taking the world by storm

Cedarburg wrestler spends summer honing his craft

CEDARBURG — Bryce Jankowski, a Cedarburg wrestler who will enter eighth grade at First Immanuel Lutheran this fall, has had a busy summer season of wrestling.

It all started in May with a trip to train with wrestlers in Hungary.

As part of the World Wrestling Tour with head coach Jerad Lewis from Stoughton, Jankowski traveled to Budapest, Hungary, to practice and train with their wrestlers, as well as tour the country, from May 11 through May 18.

"This was a trip of a lifetime, just a great trip overall," Jankowski said. "We were able to learn from Hungary Olympic coaches and the wrestlers in Hungary were very competitive."

The members of the USA team would practice with the Hungary wrestlers up to three times a day, then travel throughout the country

"We toured the Parliament, the Basilica, the Church in the Cave, many castles, we had a night cruise on the Danube, and also went through parts of Slovakia. We would get our practice time in, but would have time to see the sites," Jankowski said. "This is a tour that I would love to do again.

Jankowski's trip was sponsored by Lance Johnson, owner of Johnson Brass of Saukville.

"When we would exchange gifts with the Hungary kids, and they would have big smiles on their face," Jankowski said about one of the many highlights of the trip. "They especially loved getting T-shirts from us."

After taking second in the WWF State Greco Meet at 105 pounds, he placed fifth at the Northern Plains Regional in Rochester,

Minn., to qualify for the ASICS/USA National Tournament in Wisconsin Dells July 6 through July 8.

Jankowski went 2-2 and did not place at the national meet, but his experience this summer has him setting ambitious goals for the future.

"My goals are to win a state title in high school, win a Fargo National title and wrestle at a NCAA Div. 1 college," Jankowski revealed.

In between wrestling tournaments, Jankowski trains with the Cedarburg Matdogs, and also goes to Ringers in Menomonee Falls four times a week. Ringers is a longtime, successful wrestling club coached by Jim Schmitz, the former

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head wrestling coach at Marquette University.

"The Ringers club has many workout partners that push me every day. It is a good wrestling club to go to," Jankowski said. "The kids are dedicated to wrestling almost year round."

In June, Jankowski also traveled to Iowa to participate in the week-long J Robinson Intensive Training Camp, which is arguably the top wrestling camp in the nation.

Many people believe that championships are won in the offseason. If that is the case, the future in wrestling for Jankowski looks bright.

It was decided Putzer would tie two different streamers, one with two gray feathers as underwings, and one with white bucktail for the underwing. Other than those underwings, they would both have a light chartreuse Krystal Flash overwing, a gray hackle collar and a white thread head.

The friend needed 17 flies (a big wedding); one of those would be tied on a shortshanked No. 4 hook, as opposed to the X-longshanked No. 4 hooks used for all the others. The small one would be for the young groomsman (ring bearer). As with all of Putzer's flies, they would be barbless.

Putzer went to work. Well into the project, he said to himself, "Self, you have never tied this many flies that had to look alike before. I think you have finally become a real fly tier.'
